For two weeks in a row, at the annual meeting of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Renfrewshire West and at the 225th anniversary meeting and rededication of Lodge Greenock St. John's No. 175, the start of the meeting was slightly delayed as we had to bring more chairs into the Temple. In his report to the Lodge at the annual meeting, Provincial Grand Secretary confirmed that on average, attendance figures are on the increase as are the overall number of candidates being initiated within the Lodges.

Most Lodges currently have applications to work through and the standard of ritual work remains consistently high throughout the Lodges.

Lodge Sir Michael No. 989 are currently engaged in a very ambitious project to rebuild their Temple and the work is progressing well with much credit due to the brethren involved.

All Lodges were well represented at the annual meeting of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Renfrewshire West which has not always been the case in the past. The new Provincial Grand Master's Charity Fund is building nicely and of course, once again, we are looking forward to a *Summer Ball*, with all the Lodges participating in this very happy event. (In fact, it is looking as if the demand for tickets might exceed supply so make sure you don't miss out).

It's good sometimes, to pause and count your blessings. In the Province of Renfrewshire West, we have many more reasons to be positive than negative. Talk up your Lodges and your achievements. Talk up the Province. We may not be the largest Province under the Grand Lodge of Scotland but that in itself has its own advantages.

I have visited all the Lodges on as regular a basis, as time and circumstances allow, during the session so far and can honestly say that I have never left a single meeting without a happy feeling (and nothing to do with alcohol consumption)!

Happiness will breed success, so keep a smile on your face, consider any problems you face as a challenge to be overcome and I have no doubts whatsoever that the Province has a bright future ahead.

Please be reminded that it is important that Test Fees are kept up to date. Most Lodges now offer the facility of paying by direct debit which is an excellent way of ensuring that you are always clear in your Lodge. In particular, it is also important to make sure that if you are an affiliate member of another Lodge, you must be clear in ALL Lodges in which you are a member to ensure that you may continue to visit other Lodges. Address by Provincial Grand Master.

At the rededication ceremony of Lodge Greenock St. John's No. 175 on Saturday 14th February, I gave a short address to the brethren which is customary at such ceremonies. For some inexplicable reason, I was asked by a few of the brethren if I would publish the content of the address in the West Column which I have included below.

Change.

I mentioned earlier that it did not seem like 25 years since the bi-centenary of the Lodge but if truth be told, so much has changed in the intervening years.

For a starter, I had hair (yes I did) and the end of my tie still reached the top of my trousers. Now I find that I have reached that age when I prefix words with the word "wee". I'll just have a wee lie down, a wee seat, or a wee drink. People now phone me a 09.00 am and ask did I wake you. Even worse when they phone after lunch and ask the same question. It now takes me two shots to get up from the chair and I'm more likely to be told to slow down by the doctor than the traffic cops. Yes, so much has changed in the last 25 years never mind the last 225 years.

So it is maybe worth taking a moment to reflect just how long it has actually been since this Lodge was consecrated in 1790. Consider some of the events around the time of the last decade of the 18th century.

1790 was the year that Flora MacDonald and Adam Smith died. It had only been 4 years since Highland Mary died in the town and was a year before Burns was to write his epic tale of Tam O'Shanter. The French revolution and the Mutiny on the Bounty took place. The Forth and Clyde Canal opened and there was the first petition for the abolition of slavery. The shoe lace was invented, George Washington gave the first "state of the nation" address, Mozart premiered his work Cosi fan tutte and just another decade would go by before 96 men from the town were lost at the Battle of Trafalgar, including reputedly, brethren of this Lodge.

My purpose in quoting these facts is not to provide you with a history lesson but to emphasise just how much the world has changed in the last two centuries and also to put in perspective the challenges that the founding members of the Lodge would have faced.

Change is something that we often approach with fear and mistrust. The very word strikes fear into the heart of the traditionalist. There is often a great reluctance to change sometimes at the expense of our traditions and customs and this is perhaps nowhere more evident than within the ranks of freemasonry which has often been slow to change, to move with the times, to adapt to circumstances.

How many times have we heard the phrase, it's tradition! But we should not confuse tradition or custom with ideals and values.

Harry S Truman said that "men make history and not the other way around. In periods where there is no leadership, society stands still. Progress occurs when courageous, skillful leaders seize the opportunity to change things for the better".

On a lighter note, it could be said that the tortoise only makes progress when he sticks his head out of his shell.

Even Grand Lodge, whose ability to change and progress could perhaps unkindly be likened to the speed of a tortoise, are in the middle of reviewing the Grand Committee structure. And the best of luck with that - the only thing that can be guaranteed from the outcome is that it won't please everybody. But it needs doing and it will take men of courage to make decisions.

Freemasonry today faces many challenges, different to those faced in 1790. In years gone by local heavy industry provided a ready recruitment ground for membership. Young men of today have different interests, more cash in their pockets and a huge range of attractions to relieve them of their cash.

To survive as an organisation, we must do more to establish what appeals to young men. How to get our message across, how to make membership worthwhile and fulfilling.

So we must be bold and ready to take decisive action;

Does midweek televised football mean that you have to review your meeting night? Can we still afford to operate from premises that are a continual drain on our finances? Should we consider summer meetings with a winter break? We are part of an ageing population with an ageing membership. How many of our brethren experience access problems to upper floors in our Lodges? How many of our aged brethren are put off going to meetings in the dark winter months and would an afternoon meeting on a Saturday make a difference?

Are we offering enough social activities in our Lodges? Should I as PGM be doing more to draw the Lodges together? Do we offer enough training for new members and office-bearers? How many of our brethren taking up a new office are given any guidance regarding what the office entails?

We must constantly question what we are doing, why we are doing it and is there a better way. Just because it is traditional or customary does not mean that it is effective!

Thomas Carlyle said "Today is not yesterday; we ourselves change; how can our works and thoughts if they are always to be the fittest, continue always the same? Change indeed is painful; yet ever needful".

I will not dwell on the Lodge history as I suspect that will be covered later in the day at the dinner.

However, I do think that we have to take a lesson from the many distinguished brethren of this Lodge who, through two centuries, have often been required to take bold decisions to move the Lodge forward. Like the title of Brother McKillop's excellent history of the Lodge "They passed this way". Aye and left their mark!

Now brethren before the traditionalists amongst you get overly excited that your PGM is advocating wholesale changes and the introduction of disco lights in the 3rd degree ceremony, I would reiterate what I said earlier, do not confuse tradition and custom with ideals and values.

The concepts of charity and benevolence, of peace, harmony and brotherly love are what makes freemasonry unique and separates us from lesser organisations.

These ideals were evident in the early years of Lodge Greenock St. John's No. 175 and are still evident today.

I congratulate the brethren of the Lodge on reaching this milestone in their history and will conclude with the words of the Dalai Lama, "Open your arms to change - but don't let go of your ideals".
