The annual match at Ardgowan on 30th April ended in a comfortable win for Lodge Crawfurdsburn. The trophy goes back to them for a year (at least)!


Previous Meeting Tuesday 19th April Mark Degree

The Lodge was well filled with 34 Brethren of No XII and 21 visiting Brethren in attendance. RWM Bro Allan MacFeate welcomed all the Brethren to the meeting, especially all the visiting Brethren. The Brethren of No XII showed their appreciation of the attendance by all the visitors this evening. RWM Bro Allan MacFeate invited all reigning Masters and Past Masters to the East. Bro Edward Ross, RWM of Lodge Greenock St John's No 175, Bro Gordon Leitch, RWM of Lodge Cumberland Kilwinning No 217 and Bro Nicholas Stetz, RWM of Lodge Firth of Clyde Gourock No 626 accepted the invitation.

The brethren of No XII, carried out the Mark ritual: **Conductor**: Bro Kenneth K. Morrison PM; **Junior Overseer**: Bro Ken MacDougall PM; **Senior Overseer**: Bro Alistair Glenny PM; **Master Overseer**: Bro Robert Bain PM; **Prayer**: WSW Bro Allan Glen; **Obligation**: RWMM Bro Allan MacFeate; **Secrets & Lecture**: Bro James Livingstone; **Working Tools & Badge**: Bro Kenneth K. Morrison PM; **The Charge**: WJW Bro Bob Crossan. There were 6 candidates.

The History of the Mark Degree in No XII

The first time that the Mark Degree was worked in No XII was in August 1902. The detail is given in the scan below which is from the *Greenock Telegraph*. This was obviously a popular innovation as 42 brethren presented themselves to take the Mark.



The Lieutenant Colonel Charles Cunningham Scott mentioned in the piece above as being welcomed to the mysteries of the Craft, was, of course a member of the Scott Shipbuilding dynasty and the brother of one of No XII's most eminent and celebrated brethren, Bro RL Scott PM. Their father, John Scott, was a member of No XII. These two Scott brothers presented No XII's handsome charter case, which they had manufactured from the casemate armour of the cruiser HMS Argyll which was being built in the Cartsburn Dockyard in 1909.

The Cartsburn Dockyard claimed to be the oldest shipbuilding yard in the world, having been established by John Scott in 1711. There was a plaque in the small garden in the yard, unveiled by the Duke of Edinburgh in 1961, which commemorated this. Now, of course nothing is left of the yard but a new plaque was sited at the head of the small derelict drydock in 2012 after a public campaign. It was unveiled by Nigel Willis, the grandson of Charles Cunningham Scott.

Interestingly, while this Telegraph cutting has the date of 6th August 1902 written on it, this date must refer to when the meeting was held and not the date of publication of the newspaper. Research in the No XII roll book shows Charles Cunningham Scott initiated on 6th August and James Leggatt, a railway clerk, passed the same evening. This must all have happened before the Mark Degree. One can only assume that the brethren in these days had great stamina! Bro CC Scott was passed on 20th August 1902 and Raised on 10th September.



Another brother with a military rank, Major DFD Neill, is mentioned in the article because he presented the Mark stones for the degree to the Lodge. Of course, these are the stones that are still used today. Bro Neill was a sugar refiner, a member of the family that were partners in the company (Neill, Dempster and Neill). They owned a refinery at Dellingburn, Greenock. Bro Neill went on to be RWM of No XII in 1905-06. The stones are shown on the left and below.

The Mark Degree Plans were presented by Bro Alf Flett Substitute Master on 7th May 1912 and the Mark Tools by Lodge Crawfurdsburn Greenock No 1121 on 22nd March 1916.



A very special Mark Degree

I am indebted to Bro Derek A Kirkpatrick PM for the following report on a unique evening in the history of No XII.

The Charity Millennium Mark Degree

As we approached the year 2000, many individuals and organizations, all across the globe started to make plans for events to mark the beginning of the new millennium.

In this, Freemasons were no exception, with many Orders making arrangements for a series of events to celebrate this occasion.

One of the events which took place, was the Charity Millennium Mark Degree, which was intended to forge closer relationships between Craft and Royal Arch Masons, as well as raising money for local charities.

Unlike England, in Scotland the Mark Degree is conferred in both Craft Lodges and Royal Arch Chapters, thus providing a common degree in which members of both Orders were qualified to attend.

Having said that, there was a great deal of work which had to be done in order to get the appropriate permissions, dispensations and protocols formally approved by both Orders in order to have this meeting, so that both Brethren and Companions could meet together without breaching the Constitution and Laws of either Order.

This was a difficult and complicated task, and it was only made possible by the hard work and support of both the Provincial Grand Lodge Of Renfrewshire West and the Provincial Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Renfrewshire, who liaised with both the Grand Lodge Of Scotland, and the Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter Of Scotland respectively.

As a result, a Mark Degree was held on Wednesday 19th January 2000 within the premises of Lodge Doric Kilwinning No. 68, where the meeting was opened by the Companions of Greenock Royal Arch Chapter No 17, then advanced to the Mark Degree, at which point Mark Master Masons who were not Royal Arch Masons were admitted, and the Degree was conferred by the Brethren of Lodge Greenock Kilwinning No. XII.

This was indeed an historic meeting as we have a Mark Lodge being opened by Royal Arch Companions wearing their Royal Arch Regalia, being held under the Charter of a Royal Arch Chapter, with Craft Masons in attendance wearing their Craft regalia, and the degree being conferred by a Craft Lodge.

The occasion was a great success, and we were doubly honoured on that evening to have in attendance not only a deputation from the Provincial Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Renfrewshire, but also a deputation from The Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter Of Scotland consisting of the following Most Excellent Companions:-

M.E.C. The Rev John K. Clark M.B.E., the Third Grand Principal of Scotland

M.E.C. Allan McEwen, Past Second Grand Principal of Scotland

M.E.C. Grahame J. Smith, Grand Scribe E.

Following the meeting, there was a dinner with various toasts, and entertainment was provided by Bro. Iain Darroch who gave a short talk on the history of the unusual shuttle pipes, followed by a recital of pipe music from around the world.

The meeting was covered in the Greenock Telegraph on Thursday 27th January 2000, and a scan from their article of the photograph of the speakers and distinguished guests appears below:-





A FEW HISTORICAL POINTS ...

Lodge Greenock Kilwinning No. XII and Greenock Royal Arch Chapter No.XVII have formed a part of the history of Greenock since the 18th century and, in the ensuing years, many members of both Lodge and Chapter have exerted a powerful influence over the evolution of the area.

Until fairly recently It was almost a tradition that the Shaw - Stewarts, the landlords of the area, joined both No. XII and No. XVII, and several members of that family went on to hold very high positions in Freemasonry.

The area's main industry at the time, shipbuilding, was well represented in Masonic circles and, in 1903, Charles Cunningham Scott and Arthur Caird joined No. XVII. In addition to being brothers of No.XII, they were the owners of two of the biggest shipyards in the area and, over the years, provided employment for many of our members.

Lodge Greenock Kilwinning No. XII was founded in 1728 and it's first R.W.M. was Brother James Gilmour.

The Lodge was represented at Mary's Chapel, Edinburgh, on 30th November 1736, at the institution of Grand Lodge of Scotland, and in 1737, when Archibald Govan was R.W.M., the Lodge's Charter was granted.

Just six years later, Stirling Rock Royal Arch Chapter No.2 was founded, but almost half a century was to elapse before the area had it's own chapter.

Greenock Royal Arch Chapter No. XVII held it's first meeting in January 1789, it's Charter is endorsed to that effect, and probably worked under a warrant issued by the Irish Grand Encampment of Knights Templar.

Following the formation of Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Scotland in August 1817, Most Noble Commander James Morrison received a Charter, on behalf of Greenock Royal Arch Chapter, and became the Chapter's first M.E.Z. in March 1818.

Bro Alex More PM – nearly 56 Years in No XII



Bro Alex More is our senior Past Master having been in the Chair of No XII between 1973 and 1975. He had his 90th birthday recently and the Lodge sent him a card, signed by everyone at a meeting, and a gift for his garden. I went to see Alex with Bros Kenny Morrison PM and Alistair Glenny PM last week. Bro Alistair drove us in quick fashion up to Luncarty in Perthshire where Bro Alex has lived for some time. Previous to that he had been in Killin for a number of years.



When we arrived, we fund Bro Alex in great order having been treating his garden furniture in the morning. Bro Alex has a huge garden which he keeps in pristine condition himself. We all benefited from Alex's green fingers to the tune of a big bag of rhubarb! After a wee catch up, Bro Kenny presented Alex with his 50 Year Jubilee Certificate (photo left). It was a bit overdue as he was Initiated on 6th December 1960!

After the presentation, we all went out and had a spot of lunch at Bankfoot. It was

great to look back over the years and talk about the 'worthies' that we could remember in the Lodge and in the Greenock area in general.

We also got an insight into Alex's past. Brought up on a croft near Wick, he was very much a son of the land. He was involved heavily in the work of the croft after school each day and in the holidays. Not only was there no electricity on the croft – the drinking water had to be bought from a well some distance away and this one of Alex's jobs.

A clever boy, he was Dux of his primary school and went into the top academic stream in secondary. Sadly he had to drop to the practical group because he was unable to do the required reading and homework by the light of the small paraffin lamp in the croft.

When we asked how he came to Greenock, he told us an interesting tale. He was due to go to the Palestine Police to do his National Service but, because of the changing political situation the Middle East that force was disbanded with the establishment of the independent state of Israel. Alex was then offered a position in the police in Scotland in either the Borders, Glasgow or Greenock. Although he had never been in Greenock he came here because he did not want to serve in either Glasgow or the Borders!

During his time in the Greenock Burgh Police, he studied at college part-time and gained 2 Higher National diplomas. He qualified as a teacher of technical subjects and, eventually, by the time he was 37 had a University degree too. Alex ended his career as a Lecturer in the Education department at the University of Glasgow.

In fact, one of his students (in 1969) was Bro Robert Geddes, now a Past Master of Lodge St John Whiteinch No 683 and a great friend of No XII. Bobby told me that when he was training to be a technical teacher, Alex always made building drawing really interesting by relating it to his own experiences in construction. The amazing thing was that when I said to Alex that a Bro Geddes remembered him as his lecturer, he got his first name and described him accurately ... all at the age of 90 and he had not seen him for over 40 years!

When we were leaving Luncarty after a very pleasant afternoon, Bro Alex assured us that he will try to get down to Greenock in the new session.
