
### Lodge Memorabilia

### Bro. HRH The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh 1921 - 2021

The nation was united in grief when it was announced that Prince Philip had passed to The Grand Lodge Above on Friday 9<sup>th</sup> April. Of course, he had been in failing health for some time, but he appears to have faced the end with characteristic courage, indicating that he did not wish to return to hospital. Much has been said and written about the man and his life. To us in the Craft, we were proud that he was a Mason and part of (sadly) an increasingly rare breed, namely a member of the Royal family who is in the Craft.

Commander Prince Philip was duly initiated into the Navy Lodge on 5 December 1952 at an Emergency Meeting held in Freemasons' Hall, when no private guests were allowed. There were fifty-two lodge members present and just twelve official guests, including the MW Grand Master, The Earl of Scarbrough. Following his rapid promotion, now Admiral-ofthe Fleet Prince Philip was passed on 6 March and raised on 4 May 1953 with the MW Grand Master (again) and MW Grand Master of Scotland in attendance. Twenty-one officers of Navy Lodge were joined by sixty-nine members, forty-two official guests and eighty-five other guests. Though he since and in 2002 was recognised as a 50-year mason.

In the last edition, I mentioned that I had a visit from Bro. Calum Grant, son of the late Bro Ian, latterly of No XII but originally a Mason in Malta. Calum was telling me that his dad had said that one of his claims to fame was that he had once sat in Open Lodge with Prince Philip and Lord Mountbatten who was, of course, Philip's uncle. Another No. XII connection comes from Bro. Alex Gray who said," My uncle had the privilege of befriending him when they served together on HMS Ramillies during the War."

# **Remembering Prince Philip**

Of course, Prince Philip is remembered by many for instituting The Duke of Edinburgh's Award. It is a life-changing experience, an opportunity for enjoyment with friends, an opportunity to discover new interests and talents and a tool to develop essential skills for life and work.

The DofE is many things to many people, supporting generations to successfully navigate adult life. It is a recognised mark of achievement and respected by employers.

Over the years, I have seen the benefits accruing to young people from participation in the award. Our own members have seen their sons and daughters gaining from the Award. From a personal point of view, the involvement with DofE and its benefits, were best illustrated when I was Principal at Newlands Junior College working with young people who had been failed by the education system and had subsequently disengaged from their local authority schools. One of the things we believed to be important in the process of re-engagement was that they participated in the DofE and it was a joy to see the benefits that these young people accrued from their involvement.

To remember Price Philip and his work, Bro Alan D Beck suggested that we make a donation to DofE. An appeal was issued to members and very quickly, over £200 was raised. As a result, No. XII has donated £99 to the DofE locally in Inverclyde and £99 nationally. Hopefully, this will help to support more young people in this worthy activity.

# Masters of No. XII The Missing Years –<u>ANOTHER</u> Important Discovery

The Minute of 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1858 mentions <u>Past Master</u> D MacNicoll. We do not have a date for him in the Chair (Photo 2 below) but, of course, we have no Minute books to span the years 1796 till 1854. The Minute of December 1855 (undated and first in the 'new' book), with Bro John Scott Jr. signing as RW Master states, "Bro. Crawford declined in present position of maters (sic) to undertake the duty of secretary when it was arranged that D MacNicoll retain the position of

secretary/Treasurer for another year and that Bro Crawford act as assistant Secy... "Thanks were expressed to Bro Macnicoll on behalf of the Lodge for "... the grateful feeling it entertains towards him for the long and arduous services he has performed for it since 1847 ..."

Obviously, Bro. MacNicoll had been around the Lodge for a fair time, and had rendered great service to it, but exactly when he was RW Master we cannot say – yet!


### Lord Inverclyde (1897 – 1957) A Brother of No XII Part 7



We are back to Lord Inverclyde's service records. The card on the top (below) is magnified underneath. Having been on the reserve list, he is called up on 25<sup>th</sup> April 1940 and posted to be Aidede-Camp at HQ Lines of communication in the British Expeditionary Force. Of course, the BEF was in France and not doing all that well. A month or so later (26<sup>th</sup> May till 4<sup>th</sup> June 1940) came the famous evacuation from Dunkirk. During the Battle of Dunkirk from May 26 to June 4, 1940, some 338,000 British Expeditionary



Force (BEF) and other Allied troops (198,000 British and 140,000 French)were evacuated from Dunkirk to England as German forces closed in on them.



The massive operation, involving hundreds of naval and civilian vessels, became known as the "Miracle of Dunkirk". However, Lord Inverclyde was not one of the 338,000.

After June 4<sup>th</sup>, some 90,000 Allied troops were still in France. Inverclyde was evacuated from St Nazaire and was on board the RMS *Lancastria* when she was sunk off St Nazaire on 17 June 1940, becoming part of Britain's greatest sea tragedy. By the mid-afternoon of 17 June she had embarked an unknown number (estimates range from 4,000 up to 9,000) line-ofcommunication troops (together with about forty civilian

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refugees, including embassy staff employees and of Fairev Aviation of Belgium with their families. People were crowded into whatever spaces were available including the large cargo holds. One Royal Engineers officer reported that he had been told by one of Lancastria's loading officers that over 7,200 people had come aboard. Captain Sharp estimated the number to be 5,500.<sup>[21]</sup>

At 13:50, during an air-raid, the nearby Oronsay, a 20,000-ton Orient Liner, was hit on the

bridge by a German bomb. *Lancastria* (right) was free to depart and the captain of the British destroyer HMS *Havelock* advised her to do so; but, without a destroyer escort as defence against possible submarine attack, Sharp decided to wait for *Oronsay* before leaving.

A fresh air raid began at 15:50 by Junkers Ju 88 bomber aircraft. *Lancastria* was hit by three or



possibly four bombs. A number of survivors reported that one bomb had gone down the ship's single funnel, which is most likely, given the speed with which the ship sank – about 15–20 minutes. As the ship began to list to starboard, orders were given for the men on deck to move to the port side in an effort to counteract it, but this caused a list to port which could not be corrected. The ship was equipped with sixteen lifeboats and 2,500 life jackets; but many of the boats could not be launched because they had been damaged in the bombing or because of the angle of the hull. The first boat away was filled with women and children but it capsized on landing in the water and a second had to be lowered for them. A third boat had its bottom stove in by landing too fast. A large number of men who jumped over the side were killed by hitting the side of the hull or had their necks broken by their life jackets on impact with the water. As Lancastria began to capsize, some of those who were still on board managed to scramble onto the ship's underside. The ship sank at 16:12, within twenty minutes of being hit, which gave little time for other vessels to respond. Many of those in the water drowned because there were insufficient life jackets, or died from hypothermia, or were choked by fuel oil. According to Jonathan Fenby in his book The Sinking of the Lancastria, the German aircraft strafed survivors in the water. Estimates of those who perished range from 3.000 to 5,500.


Survivors were taken aboard other British and Allied evacuation vessels, the trawler *HMT Cambridgeshire* rescuing 900. Lord Inverclyde was one of them. I have no information as to how he got there or what had horrors fo had transpired for him in between.

Cambridgeshire was a 443-ton anti-submarine trawler, which had been requisitioned by the navy in August 1939; she was then given a 4-inch gun, machine guns and depth charges. After returning to England, a grateful Inverclyde presented each of his rescuers with a round rosewood box full of cigarettes, each box with an engraved silver plaque, each individually named and then given the wording "... HMS Cambridgeshire, St Nazaire to Plymouth, 17 to 19 June 1940, from a grateful passenger, Inverclyde/Scots Guards"; an appreciative response to what must have been a terrifying experience.

The supreme irony was that *Lancastria*, prior to government requisition, had been a Cunard ship. Lord Inverclyde's father, had of course, been a director of Cunard.
