Master's Charity.

As has been recent tradition in Lodge Sir Michael, we invite a Lodge to confer a degree in June of each year and designate that as the "Masters charity". In recent years we have invited Lodge Georgetown Cardonald 1170 and Lodge Glennifer 1219 from Renfrewshire East to confer a degree. Both Lodges have, and continue to bring larger numbers of brethren to these evenings and we very much feel that this fostering of relationships further cements the Masonic friendships we have with both of these Lodges in particular. The number of visitors that Renfrewshire East bring to our Lodge throughout the sessions and not just on those evenings is very much appreciated, and indeed, is reciprocated wherever possible.

In 2013, the degree was conferred by the Degree team of Lodge Georgetown Cardonald. A large turn-out of Renfrewshire East brethren were in attendance along with the Sir Michael brethren and other visitors from our own Province. After the fine degree was concluded, we moved into harmony and the usual Masters charity raffle took place. At the end of the evening, a sum of £300 was raised by all the brethren present which the RWM (Paul Docherty) thanked them most sincerely for. At this point the RWM stated that, as had been his declared intention during his tenure, the charitable donation should be within our local community which had been somewhat overlooked in previous years. On this occasion, the monies would be presented to Kidston Kids in the village.

Kidston Kids is a charitable organisation run by a group of parents/grandparents in Kilmacolm Village (Old Kirk church hall)

They offer a music group for babies, a playgroup and older children groups and rent from the Old Kirk Church. This provides a vital transition for the kids between Playgroup and Nursery level which benefits all.

As with all organisations, they are feeling the pinch financially and are subject to market forces AND also a Scottish Govt policy to offer Free Nursery places to qualifying children. These combined make for a very tough environment for them to exist. Fiona Bretherton, the Playleader, applies for grants/assistance wherever she can and is constantly on the look out for revenue streams or help from anywhere to keep the organisation afloat. I have no hesitation in presenting this years Masters charity monies to Kidston Kids and wish them well in their future endeavours. We now have a relationship with this Organisation within Kilmacolm which I genuinely hope may prosper in the months and years going forward. (No more so than a wee donation from Lodge Sir Michael of some Plants during our annual sale that the kids can tend and nurture)

Brethren, I am indebted to Brother George Nixon, Past Master of Lodge Crawfurdsburn No. 1121 for the following article and I would urge you all to read it as it has a very important lesson for us all.

The Carpenter

Once upon a time, two brothers who lived on adjoining farms fell into conflict. It was the first serious rift in 40 years of farming side-by-side, sharing machinery and trading labour and goods as needed without a hitch.

Then the long collaboration fell apart. It began with a small misunderstanding and it grew into a major difference and finally, it exploded into an exchange of bitter words followed by weeks of silence.

One morning there was a knock on John's door. He opened it to find a man with a carpenter's toolbox. "I'm looking for a few days' work," he said. "Perhaps you would have a few small jobs here and there I could help with? Could I help you?"

"Yes," said the older brother. "I do have a job for you. Look across the creek at that farm. That's my neighbor. In fact, it's my younger brother! Last week there was a meadow between us. He recently took his bulldozer to the river levee and now there is a creek between us. Well, he may have done this to spite me, but I'll do him one better. See that pile of lumber by the barn? I want you to build me a fence an 8-foot fence -- so I won't need to see his place or his face anymore."

The carpenter said, "I think I understand the situation. Show me the nails and the post-hole digger and I'll be able to do a job that pleases you."

The older brother had to go to town, so he helped the carpenter get the materials ready and then he was off for the day. The carpenter worked hard all that day -- measuring, sawing and nailing. About sunset when the farmer returned, the carpenter had just finished his job.

The farmer's eyes opened wide, his jaw dropped. There was no fence there at all.

It was a bridge a bridge that stretched from one side of the creek to the other! A fine piece of work, handrails and all! And the neighbor, his younger brother, was coming toward them, his hand outstretched

"You are quite a fellow to build this bridge after all I've said and done."

The two brothers stood at each end of the bridge, and then they met in middle, taking each other's hand. They turned to see the carpenter hoist his toolbox onto his shoulder.

"No, wait! Stay a few days. I've a lot of other projects for you," said the older brother. "I'd love to stay on," the carpenter said, "but I have many more bridges to build."
