The West Column



We are now well through our programme of annual visits and apart from the quality of ritual and excellent attendance figures (keep it up brethren), it has been very pleasing to note the very high standard of candidates being introduced to the Craft. While the numbers of initiates are not perhaps what they were decades ago, statistics would suggest that the numbers remain fairly static over the last ten years or so. However, the fact that intrants are perhaps fewer simply makes it more important for us to ensure that we do all that we can to retain the new members that we have. This is something that we are giving a great deal of thought to at the moment.

It is also a task in which EVERYONE can make a contribution!

So far as Provincial Grand Lodge are concerned, we have organised a very successful seminar for new members earlier in the session and all candidates initiated within the past two years should now be in possession of a specially published information book. If not, please contact your lodge secretary who has been provided with copies. We are now following that up with the creation of a short life working group chaired by the Provincial Grand Lodge Director of Ceremonies, Brother James Cowan, who is also the current Right Worshipful Master of The Anchor Lodge of Research No. 1814. Brother Jim and the members of his team are currently in the process of interviewing senior office-bearers within each lodge along with all who have been initiated within the past two years in a bid to establish, what has worked well, what has not worked, whether the support received was sufficient, were questions answered, were candidates taken to other lodges, were they encouraged to witness other lodges at work before receiving the next degree, what views have been established on the Craft and most particularly, what can we do to make the whole experience for new members more rewarding and fulfilling.

It is almost certain that if we do not grab the interest and attention of new members within the first year of their membership, they are likely to drift away from the lodge. We are also looking at ways of bringing the Province even closer together and you will hear some of those ideas over the next few weeks. Following up on a very simple suggestion which we have already received, you will note that the weekly advert in the Greenock Telegraph, now carries the line, "for further information on Freemasonry in the Province, please go to www.pglrw.org". Not an earth-shattering suggestion perhaps but it may provide a starting point for a future member who does not have any known masonic connections in which to assist him in starting his journey.

Once we have completed the interviewing process, we will review the responses and this will help us to develop a plan of action to take forward in the new session. I sincerely hope that if you are contacted by Brother Cowan, that you will give him every possible assistance.

That brings me of course, to the matter on hand, what can you as possibly an established and experienced freemason do especially if you have no personal involvement with the candidate. Well remember the story of the widow's mite that every contribution is important however small.

It is quite common for a candidate having passed through his latest degree to be hustled away to the bar by his friends or his proposer and seconder and I would certainly not deny him such enjoyment. However, this can have the effect of shielding him from the other members of the lodge but how many of us take a moment at the end of a meeting to introduce ourselves, speak with the candidate and make him feel welcome?

So make sure that a new candidate is introduced all round, perhaps the Master could stand at the door of the lodge after a meeting with the candidate from the evening's degree and every Brother present personally congratulate him. Make time to speak with him, discuss the degree with him, include him in the work of the lodge, even if it is only to sell raffle tickets or wash cups. Make him feel important and that he is contributing to the life of the lodge.

Simply extending the hand of friendship will be a great start.

Fees:

Test Fees:

Please be reminded that it is important that Test Fees are kept up to date. Most Lodges now offer the facility of paying by direct debit which is an excellent way of ensuring that you are always clear in your Lodge. In particular, it is also important to make sure that if you are an affiliate member of another Lodge, you must be clear in ALL Lodges in which you are a member to ensure that you may continue to visit other Lodges. Brethren who are not up to date in all Lodges have visiting rights withdrawn as well as the privileges which would normally be afforded to them in their Mother Lodges.

Capitation:

Brethren should be aware that the Capitation Fee has now been increased to £30 per active member as per the recent membership return. This is the first increase in three years and it is hoped that, if approved, this rate will be fixed for a three-year period. It may be appropriate for some Lodges to now consider whether their TEST FEES continue to be at an appropriate level.

Other Fees:

You should be aware by now that the notice of motion before Grand Lodge to amend the fees described in the First Schedule of the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Lodge of Scotland was defeated and accordingly there are no changes to those fees for the next twelve months at least.

Annual Meeting:

Friday 5th February was the date of our annual meeting and installation of elective office-bearers and in spite of this being mid-term in the Commission, it was a delight to see the Temple at Lodge Greenock St. John's No. 175 full to capacity for the meeting. There was a fine deputation from sister Provinces headed by Brother James C Peddie, the Provincial Grand Master of the Province of Glasgow.

Marcus Humphrey House:

There are a number of events being held to mark the 25th anniversary of the opening of the Marcus Humphrey House, which is, of course, within the Province of Renfrewshire West.

Firstly there will be a zip line challenge being jointly organised by the Provinces of Lanarkshire Middle Ward, Ayrshire, Glasgow, Renfrewshire East and Renfrewshire West.

We will be promoting this event over the next few weeks, which is being jointly organised by a number of the neighbouring Provinces, including Renfrewshire West in order to raise funds for the chosen charity of Grand Lodge, Prostate Cancer Scotland.

This is a Scottish charity set up to provide information, advice and help on prostate health and diseases of the prostate. Nearly 1 in 2 men in Scotland will be affected by prostate disease at some stage in their lives and 1 in 11 are likely to develop prostate cancer. Prostate cancer is the most common cancer in men in Scotland. To bring this into perspective, of the nearly 500 brethren now on the direct distribution list for this edition of the West Column, around 40, will suffer from prostate cancer and I urge you to give your earnest consideration to supporting this charitable effort.

Participants:

I am pleased to be able to confirm that following my request for "volunteers" to take part in this event, I received names from Lodges XII, 175, 217, 626, 1121 and 1425. At first the Province was only allocated 5 spaces but after an impassioned plea to the chief organiser, this has been increased to ten spaces. Brethren it is hoped that ALL of the lodges and individual brethren will embrace this effort and whether your lodge has a brother taking part or not, that you will all lend your very best support to the challenge.

An interesting fact for the West column. When I was in Austin visiting a lodge they had a short presentation about the following.

Das Vergissmeinnicht

(The Forget-Me-Not)

The story behind the Beloved Emblem of the Craft in Germany

As early as 1934, soon after Adolf Hitler's rise to power, it became apparent that Freemasonry was in danger. In the same year , the German Grand Lodge of the Sun in Bayreuth, one of the pre-war German Grand Lodges, realised the imminent problems facing them and elected to were a little, blue flower, Das Vergissmeinnicht , in lieu of the traditional Square and Compass, as a mark of identity for Masons. It was felt that the new symbol would not attract attention from the Nazis, who were in the process of confiscating and appropriating Masonic Lodges and property. Masonry had gone underground and it was necessary that the Brethren have some readily recognisable means of identification.

Throughout the entire Nazi era, a little, blue flower in a lapel marked a Brother. In the Concentration Camps and in the cities, a little, blue Forget-Me-Not distinguished the lapels of those who refused to allow the Light of Freemasonry to be extinguished.


In 1947, when the Grand Lodge of the Sun was re-opened in Bayreuth by Past Grand Master Bayer, a little, blue pin, in the shape of a Forget-Me-Not, was proposed and accepted as the official emblem of the first annual convention of those who survived the bitter years of semi-darkness, bringing the Light of Masonry, once again, into the Temples.

At the first Annual Convention of the United Grand Lodges of Germany AF and AM, in 1948, the pin was adopted as an official Masonic emblem, honouring those valiant Brethren who carried their work on under adverse conditions. At the Grand Masters' Conference in the United States of America, Dr. Theodore Vogel, the Grand Master newly formed Vereinigte Großlogen von Deutschland, (VGLvD) AF and AM, presented one of the pins to each of the representatives of the Grand Jurisdictions with which the VGLvD, AF and AM, enjoyed fraternal relations.

Thus did a simple flower blossom forth into a meaningful emblem of the fraternity and become, perhaps, the most widely worn pin among Freemasons in Germany. In most of our lodges, the Forget-Me-Not is presented to new Master Masons, at which time its history is briefly explained.

Stunning.

For no other reason that I thought it was a stunning photograph (although I reflected on the fact that while her dad was spending a couple of days in Peebles, taking photographs of Melrose Abbey, daughter Nicola was circling Rio in a helicopter taking photos of the surrounding area). The photo below is, of course, of the Christ the Redeemer statue overlooking the city.
