Great Expectations:

It is probably true to say that we all start off new projects with great expectations and enthusiasm and sometimes when we fail to reach our goal there is a feeling of anti-climax. Defeat is not something that we like to experience.

My preferred mode of transport when I travel through to Edinburgh is by train. I like the comfort, the space and the opportunity sometimes just to have 45 minutes or so to myself when I can read a book, look at the scenery or just have a snooze.

Unfortunately, on my last trip by rail through for an 11.00 am meeting at Grand Lodge, I got on the 9.30 train from Queen Street, which should have got me into Waverley at around 10.15, in plenty of time for a leisurely stroll along Princes Street and up to Grand Lodge in time for a coffee and some of Grand Secretary's most excellent chocolate biscuits before the start of the meeting.

Alas, Scotrail were obviously unaware of my great expectations and I realised that by 10.30, the train was still some way from Waverley Station. When we finally arrived at our destination, the powers that be had decreed that they would make life even more difficult for me and instead of terminating at our usual platform, we were deposited at Platform 23.3/4 which seemed to be about 1 mile short of North Berwick, leaving me with 10 minutes to get to George Street. Needless to say by the time I arrived, the meeting had started but even worse, the chocolate biscuits had disappeared! My great expectations went unfulfilled.

I had another meeting of the Information and Communications Committee a couple of weeks ago and having read in the papers, our Scottish Government's pronouncements that following the opening of the "missing link" on the M8, journey times had been reduced by at least 20 minutes, I decided on this occasion to travel by bus. Alas my great expectations were again dashed as the bus took just as long as it had ever taken and to make matters worse, the bus had to execute an emergency stop, depositing some passengers onto the floor and making some minor medical attention necessary.

However, on the plus side, I made it to Grand Lodge before some of the others who had been held up in the Edinburgh Festival travel chaos and so got my pick of the biscuits.

It strikes me that the greater the expectation sometimes the greater the let down and this is probably true of people as well. Talking to one of my fellow Provincial Grand Masters recently, he remarked that one of the things he had noticed after he became Provincial Grand Master was that he was disappointed with some brethren who he thought he would have been able to rely on for support and who had failed to live up to his great expectations but this had been balanced out by the fact that there were others of whom he had limited expectations at the outset and yet had turned out to be hugely supportive.

The bottom line is that you cannot predict the future.

The same is true for Lodges of course. We are about to get a new session underway and for some Lodges that will mean a change in the management with a new Master at the helm and perhaps many new office-bearers taking office for the first time. There will be great expectations and sometimes these will not work out and sometimes they will exceed all expectations.

We should not be afraid of the future, of trying new things, of innovation. Some will succeed and others will fail but the most important thing is to learn from events and move on. I am currently a member of a working group looking at retention figures within the Scottish Craft and early results would suggest that after a period of five years, a Lodge will be fortunate if it can boast of a retention rate of 25 to 30%. With a low intake of new initiates, it does not take a high intelligence to realise that situation is not sustainable in the long term and we must be prepared to "think outside the box" to improve our ability to hold on to new members. The chances are that if you have not managed to capture the interest of a new member within the first 18 months, he will be lost to the Craft.

We need new ideas, for example, a number of Lodges have been holding meetings during the summer months and the attendance figures at the meetings have been extremely high. Is any Lodge in the Province willing to cancel its meetings between January and April (on a trial basis) and hold meetings instead from May through August?

We must try new ideas without worrying about great expectations. If an idea doesn't work, learn from it and move on. The experience is not wasted.

In the meantime, I hope that you have all enjoyed the summer recess and are all suitably refreshed. As we embark on another new session, I would wish every Lodge a happy and successful term with lots of new candidates (and new ideas)!

Obituaries:

Brother John Robert Spence Keith.

Reports of brethren passing to the Grand Lodge above are always tinged with sadness but some have a more profound effect than others which is the case with Brother John Keith. Brother Keith passed away after a long illness, bravely borne, on Sunday 23rd July 2017. He had been initiated into Lodge Cumberland Kilwinning No. 217 at the age of 24 on the 20th September 1973, passed on 4th October 1973 and raised on the 18th October 1973. Twenty years later, he served as Master of the Lodge from 1993 until 1995 and had the very great pleasure of also installing his two sons into the Chair, firstly Alistair from 2003 to 2005 and again from 2007 to 2007 and also Gregor, from 2005 until 2007.

Not long after completing his term of office as Master, Brother Keith took up progressive office with the Provincial Grand Lodge of Renfrewshire West but it was not long before his talents were recognised and he was commissioned by Past Provincial Grand Master, Brother Alexander Galbraith as Provincial Grand Secretary in 2003 and served in this office until 2008, when the then Provincial Grand Master Brother James W Miller commissioned him as Substitute Provincial Grand Master.

When it came my turn to serve as Provincial Grand Master, it was necessary to commission my own team and without hesitation, the first name on the team sheet was that of Brother John Keith and I was delighted that he agreed to act as Depute Provincial Grand Master during my commission.

I was also privileged to act as his proposer when he intimated to me that he wished to affiliate to Lodge Firth of Clyde, Gourock No. 626 which he did in September 2011.

Outwith the Province, Brother John Keith served as Master of Lodge Randolph No. 1434 in the Province of Renfrewshire East and also in many other Orders within freemasonry many of which he served actively and with distinction.

Outside of freemasonry, Brother Keith maintained a keen interest in the Boys' Brigade and most will know that he was a regular at a certain football club which plays at Ibrox Stadium!

His appointment as the next Provincial Grand Master had not yet been confirmed by Grand Lodge, although this would have been done at the Regular Meeting of Grand Lodge in October. It was well known that Brother Keith was looking forward to serving the Province as Provincial Grand Master and I am sure that he would have approached his Commission with the same vigour and determination as he approached all of the offices held during his 43 years as a member of the Craft.

It is impossible to do proper justice in this short obituary to the service provided by Brother John Robert Spence Keith, Depute Provincial Grand Master and his passing will be felt by all who knew him.

Brother Cornelius Coward.

It is possible that many of the readers of the West Column will not know who Brother Cornelius Coward was as he had not been in attendance at his Lodge for probably the best part of thirty years. However, that bare fact misrepresents the service that Brother Corney gave to Lodge Firth of Clyde, Gourock No. 626 where he was initiated on the 20th April 1959 and where he served as Master in 1973 to 1975. Brother Coward also entered the ranks of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Renfrewshire West and progressed through the offices to Provincial Grand Senior Warden.

Sadly, Corney's health was such that he did not feel comfortable attending meetings but that did not restrict his interest in the Lodge. In fact, when the Lodge was being rebuilt following the devastating fire some 10 years ago, Corney virtually camped outside and as I was working in Newton Mearns at the time, I received almost daily updates from Corney along with photographs showing the progress of the repairs. I can also now report that Brother Corney anonymously donated regular and substantial sums of money towards the repairs of the Lodge. Having lost many of our records in the fire, I set about compiling a short history of the Lodge and over the course of one summer, spent many an evening with Corney to tap into his encyclopaedic memory of all things relating to the Lodge and to Gourock where Corney had been born, raised and lived all of his life.

Outside of Freemasonry, his interests lay in fishing and photography and those on Facebook might be aware that whenever someone asked a question relating to Gourock's history, it was almost always Corney who provided the answer.

Sadly Brother Coward passed away after a short illness in the Larkfield Unit at Inverclyde Royal Hospital shortly after his 90th birthday and will be sadly missed by all who knew and respected him.

Brother Thomas Shields McIntyre.

It was with great sadness that we heard of the passing of Brother Thomas Shields McIntyre, a Master Mason of Lodge Cumberland Kilwinning No. 217. Brother McIntyre had fought a long and courageous battle but even when suffering ill-health, he was still attending his Lodge and was always to be found in good humour and ready to welcome you into his Lodge. Tommy, of course, was also a great ambassador for his Lodge, the Province and for Scottish Freemasonry which he demonstrated on his many visits to Canada. His attendance at Lodge Ibrox in Ontario, resplendent in his full formal highland wear was obviously a source of great pride and he would insist on showing you the photographs taken during his visits at the first opportunity. Brother Tommy's presence in the back row of the Lodge will be missed by many. Next year, Brother Tommy would have celebrated 50 years as a member of Lodge Cumberland Kilwinning No. 217 having been initiated on the 4th December 1968.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to all who have suffered loss over recent times.

A tribute to:

William Clark Second Lieutenant, 5th Bn, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Who died on Monday, 23rd April 1917. Age 27

The recent Centenary Commemorations of the Battle of Arras have prompted me to gather together a few thoughts.

Around 1992 I had reason to visit an elderly lady, Miss May Clark, in Kempock House in Gourock. She was well into her nineties but a preparatory telephone call the previous day had assured me that the former piano tutor had all her marbles and was indeed as sharp as a tack... and yes, she certainly was.

I had taken along a photograph for her to see that I knew would have been of interest to her. It was that picture from 1913 of the first office-bearers of the newly formed Masonic Lodge, Crawfurdsburn Greenock No 1121. Her father, John Clark, was the first Master and he is centred in the shot.

Miss Clark took the photograph from me but remained silent with no reaction.

I pointed out her father dressed in his full regalia but her attention was already focussed on another younger man in the second row. 'That's William', she said quietly, 'My brother. He died in the war'.

The silence returned as this ninety-something-year-old lady became a younger doting sister in her early twenties having just heard the news. A seventy-five-year-old tear came to her eye and a resigned smile came to her lips. She mentioned the impact of his death on her parents.

This was my introduction to William Clark, a man who remains to this day as my personal connection to the Great War. He is also a man with whom I seem to share so many similarities. We both grew up in the same street in the east end of Greenock, Bawhirley Rd, he at number 25 and I at 75. We both attended Hillend Primary School and both went on to the Greenock High School. We were both Secretary of Lodge Crawfurdsburn – William at its founding and myself exactly one hundred years later.

He was a talented young man. He was an assistant school master at Chapelton School in Port Glasgow and was a great student of art. It was generally thought by many that Art would eventually become his chosen profession. He was an inspirational character by all accounts.

I have read in his own handwriting how he heard the call of Lord Kitchener. I read also a letter from him dated 1915 saying how happy he was to be back at the lodge in which he modestly fails to mention that he had sustained injuries in fierce fighting at the Battle of Loos with the 6th Cameron Highlanders. He received his commission for gallantry in the field.

In early 1916 he joined the 5th Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders and was retained as an instructor at Ripon for almost a year.

Early in 1917 he returned to France and by April he was involved in the conflict around the city of Arras. He was killed on the 23rd of April of that year. A day that has been named as 'Black Monday' in the memoirs of others. Some official documents list his death as the 24th of April which suggests a cold interlude between death and the recovery of his body.

The Greenock Telegraph described him as a popular officer, winning by his frank lovable nature and his devotion the confidence and respect of both officers and men. His loss is deeply mourned, but he has died gloriously it states.

In 2001 I drove to France. Part Holiday, part unspoken pilgrimage. It was a cold, wet and windy March day when we visited that small cemetery on the Heninel to Croisilles Road. His grave was not difficult to find. Out of the three hundred or so plots, half are unidentified and eleven are German. I stood in front of the stone inscribed William Clark, aware that his final resting place would not have been initially a single plot but a long trench, and the tears came to my eyes. The futility and the waste. The unfulfilled talent of a generation. And for what?
