Obituary: Brother Jack Glenny PM, Lodge Greenock Kilwinning No. XII.

Bro John Clarke Glenny, Past Master - A Personal Reflection by Bro Alan D Beck, Past Master.

It is with deep sadness that I announce the passing to The Grand Lodge Above of our dear Brother and friend, Bro Jack Glenny PM, who died in the early hours of Sunday 15th December, 2019, and whose achievements and contributions to the local community cannot be overstated.

As well as being a long-standing member and a Past President and Honorary President of Greenock Burns Club, (The Mother Club), Jack was formerly HM's Inspector of Customs in Greenock, a Past Moderator of the Presbytery of Greenock and Paisley, a Past President of Dunrod Angling Club and of course a Past Master of Lodge Greenock Kilwinning NoXII, assuming the Chair of King Solomon on November 17th 1981 for two consecutive 12-month terms of office, as is our custom.

Earlier this year when we took the decision to formally constitute our Lodge Burns Club as a separate entity, I was very proud to propose Bro Jack as the founding President of Lodge Greenock Kilwinning NoXII Burns Club and this received the unanimous approbation of the members. This was, for me, a great personal pleasure and an opportunity to repay him in some small measure for the honour he did me by appending his signature to two application forms: the first for my membership of Greenock Burns Club (The Mother Club) and the second for my membership of Lodge Greenock Kilwinning NoXII.

For both of these I will remain eternally grateful to him. If ever a man could confidently own the adjective "much-beloved", it was Jack. His charm, wit, grace and honesty were renowned and much in evidence to all who met him. His knowledge of Burns was tremendous and this, combined with his natural humour and his numerous stories, drawn from his many interesting and varied life-strands, made him a thoroughly engaging after-dinner speaker, proving with consummate ease that speeches can be hilarious ... and clean at the same time.

As a Reader of The Church of Scotland, Jack conducted services around the country and in 2009, he was very honoured to be invited to address the Scottish Parliament at their "Time for Reflection" which is held at the beginning of each new session. As Mother Club Bard, Jack was called upon to write poetry to illustrate various important items in the Mother Club calendar and we always looked forward immensely to his work which would adorn our Annual Celebration programmes.

Only a couple of weeks ago I contacted him to wish him a happy St Andrew's Day. It was clear from his reply that he was very unwell and that he wasn't up to composing a new poem. I told him that I, as President, would compose one on his behalf and looked forward to him resuming his post in the new year - he seemed pleased by this and I was honoured that he said he knew the club was "in good hands".

Another great honour of mine took place on April the 2nd, 2014 when as Master of NoXII, I was delighted to present him with his Golden Jubilee Diploma - 50 years to the day of his initiation. Jack embodied all that is good and true about Freemasonry - he always struck me as the embodiment of the Charge to the Brethren; and that is saying something!

He also embodied the ethos of the Burns movement. He was, in the truest sense, a Friend of The Poet, and the movement will be far poorer for his passing.

I offer my deepest condolences to Elizabeth and all the family and especially to his brother Alistair Glenny Past Master, (also a much-beloved brother to us all at NoXII) who loved him dearly. On Tuesday 17th December, there was a very good attendance at the Divine Service of Lodge Crawfurdsburn No. 1121 conducted as last year by Brother George J Carson, Past Master and Chaplain of the Lodge and also Provincial Grand Chaplain. The Sermon which George delivered was excellent and I thought that it was worth sharing with a wider audience so I asked George if he would mind if I published his sermon in the West Column and he kindly agreed. Take a moment to read it through – it is well worth the effort.

SERMON 2019 delivered at the Annual Divine Service of Lodge Crawfurdsburn No. 1121 on Tuesday 17th December 2019

"Yet what I can I give Him? Give my heart".

The bible tells us that the Wise Men brought gifts: - "and when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto him gifts; gold, and frankincense and myrrh". So on the first Christmas gifts were given. However the first gift I would argue came from God: - For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son. So God gave us his Son as the first Christmas present to all mankind.

NOW THERE'S A GIFT

Following that, as we hear in the hymn "In the Bleak Mid-Winter", shepherds may have brought sheep. We know from the Bible that the Wise men brought gold, frankincense and myrrh. The first steps in giving gifts at Christmas began on the First Christmas Day. I wonder if there was any ill feeling when the lowly shepherds turned up with no expensive gifts only to be outdone by the riches of the Wise Men.

Was this the first step towards the commercialisation we have today? Since then it has become common practice ...with the commercialisation perhaps overtaking the original meaning of Christmas. The gifts to children have become so expensive that there have been moves to ask parents to consider making the smaller Christmas presents to their children from Santa and... if the there are any expensive presents like a new iPad or a bike ...that the parents give them as a gift from themselves Not Santa. This makes sense. How heart breaking must it be for children in poorer families when they hear that Santa has brought their classmates big expensive presentswhen maybe all they got was a new coat that they needed or an Oor Wullie annual and some sweets.

So even if we are poor we can still give our heart. Let's think about that. What does it mean to give your heart to your God? To me it means changing or focusing our world view to how God would want us to live our lives. To live by the principles we as Freemasons teach perhaps.

To live as God would want us to live.

How about as we say when we install the Standard Bearer...... We as Freemasons have a moto... Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. Faith Hope and Charity? That seems like a good start. Sadly in our modern world much of that seems to have become unfashionable.

The world is full of "fake news", untruths and half- truths. Some of our world leaders seem to take lying to a whole new level To them it is par for the course. They will change their story from one day to another. So let's be unfashionable. This Christmas let's give our hearts to the baby Jesus.

There is no need for gold, frankincense myrrh.

If you have riches consider what you can do to help others with some of it. Can you afford to give some relief where it is needed? Charity to all mankind. Remember the North East Corner. A bit of Brotherly Love costs nothing but can reward he who gives and he who receives.

Showing thoughtfulness and kindness to others will make them feel good but it will make you feel good too.

Be truthful. Be true to you. Except when your wife daughter or grand-daughter asks if you like her new hair style... or her new coat ... or does her bum look big in this....a wee white lie maybe works best there.

Last year I quoted the Beatles on the theme of All You Need is Love. Let me quote them again for this year's service.

The Beatles sang, "If I give my heart to you, I must be sure. From the very start, that you would love me....."

You can be assured if you give your heart to God that He will love you.

If you give your heart to God and live by the principles of your faith then others will love you too.

So whatever else you give this Christmas make sure you give your heart to the Baby Jesus. Give your heart to your God. Embrace your faith. Through that you can hope for immortality. And remember to be charitable not only to those you love but to all mankind.... Regardless of faith, creed or colour.

I would like to take the opportunity to now read you a sermon by someone else. It goes back to 1947..... but I think it is timeless. If any of you read the West Column you may have seen the short article in the December edition "A thought for the Season" from the Rev. I.M. Geordie. That article included the start to this sermon that I would now like to read in full. Don't worry, it is short.

Tonight I want to tell you the story of an empty stocking.

Once upon a midnight clear, there was a child's cry, a blazing star hung over a stable, and wise men came with birthday gifts. We haven't forgotten that night down the centuries. We celebrate it with stars on Christmas trees, with the sound of bells, and with gifts.

Let us ask ourselves what He would wish for most. And then, let each put in his share, loving kindness, warm hearts, and a stretched out hand of tolerance. All the shinning gifts that make peace on earth.

You know, to me that sermon kind of says it all. Maybe I should just shut up now and leave you with that though. But I won't! It is a heart-warming film that shows that in life love and relationships....kindness and thoughtfulness are much more important than the raising of money to build a cathedral. It is nice to give gifts to show that we are thinking on a friend or loved one. But let's not be overcome with the commercialism of Christmas.

Let's remember the stocking that wasn't hung up.

Let's remember Whose birthday we are celebrating.

Let's ask ourselves what He would wish for most.

Every day ... not just at Christmas ...put in your share of loving kindness, warm hearts, and stretch out a hand of tolerance.



While in the past each year Bro Eddie Lapsley of Lodge Doric Kilwinning No 68 along with his daughters Tracy Lapsley Fay, and Michelle Lapsley, have raised money for one of the Military Charities. This year it was decided to raise money for Local Causes.



The two causes chosen were Compassionate Inverclyde and Scheihallion the Children's Cancer ward in Glasgow. In the past the money raised was for the larger Charities as Eddie got a large amount in sponsorship from his workmates off-shore. As Eddie has now retired it was thought to turn our attention closer to home.
